The purpose of the institute is to provide specialized study for students interested in a particular academic area.

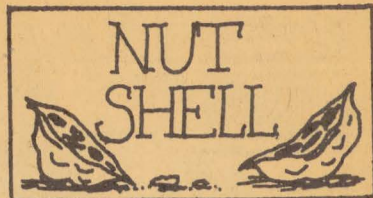
Besides the 14 students, Webster will supply two teachers for the summer school. Dr. Verby, Associate Principal, and Mr. George
