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Sophomores select cabinet members

They will serve with seniors Dave Deem, Mike Jones, Rick Smith, and Denny White; juniors Jan Bidewell, Harry Hawken, and Jeff Schweitzer, and the Council Chairman Guy Mellor. The Council's faculty sponsor is Mrs. Dorothy Weirich.

To be eligible for Guidance Council, a candidate must have a free fifth hour, a 2.5 grade average, and must have attended a Webster Groves school twenty-five weeks prior to the election.

According to extensive revisions made last year, the Guidance Council is composed of three members from each class, the student body vice-president, and a faculty advisor. Under this new system, the council may assign seventh hours

to serious offenders with the consent of the advisor, they may advise the offender of the purpose of the Honor Code, or they may discuss cases of extreme violation with the Dean of Students. The name of the student who turns in an offender of the Honor Code will not be disclosed.

Mothers hold tea for Dr. Schooling

Dr. Herbert W. Schooling, former Superintendent of the Webster Groves School System, was honored at a tea sponsored by the Central Board of Mothers October 6.

The refreshments were served in Memorial Hall of the First Congregational Church by the past presidents of the school board committee. The climax of the afternoon came when Mr. Earl R. Tweedie, president of the School Board, announced that the new senior high school library will be named after Dr. Schooling.

Last August, at the request of the school board committee, the Board of Education unanimously decided to dedicate the new library to Dr. Schooling in gratitude for his six years of outstanding work in the school system. Letters were then sent to parents of school children and to active workers of the Board of Education, asking for contributions to buy books and atlases for the new library.

The library, which will be the first portion of the expansion program to be completed, should be finished in 1965 or 1966.

Hungarian escapee to address school

Ede Pfeiffer, a participant in the 1956 Hungarian revolution and the author of Child of Communism, will speak at a special paid assembly on November 6. His book is an account of his life in Communist Hungary.

He has become well-known in Great Britain and the United States through his lectures and appearances on radio and television. The British Broadcasting Corporation has broadcast parts of his book to Ease Germany since the Berlin Crisis.

Mr. Pfeiffer had to reject his planned law career when he was not admitted to a university because of the Communist Party's "Schooling Program". After fleeing from his native Hungary, he went to England where he studied English and wrote his book.
