Gridders discuss **T-Day prospects**


Webster coaches and players agree that the Turkey Day game tomorrow will probably be close. They also believe that to win, the Statesmen must contain Kirkwood's Bernie Kemple, a veteran runner and passer.

On the other hand, Kirkwood coach Bill Lenich says that the Pioneers will concentrate on stopping the passing of "that new fella" (Clarence Thornhill) and the running of Walt Smallwood.

Statesmen head coach, Ray Moss, feels that "there'll be pretty much scoring. We'll try to run, but I expect we'll have to throw." Although backfield coach Robert Hoffmann doesn't look for a high scoring battle, he admits that "both teams pass, and you never know."

Webster players feel that they can keep the Frisco bell this year. Injured lineman Ron Mautz thinks the griders have a fine chance with "the passing looking good and fullback Dave Cloud starting to run better." Reflecting on the Webster defense, Mautz said, "If we stop Kemple's sweeps, we can beat 'em.''

John Stocke, defensive back, sees the contest as a tossup. He remarked, "Kemple will complete his share of passes, but we hope to stop the long bomb."

Linemen

Coach Moss rated senior left end Ken Penrod, who was out last season with a broken ankle, as a good blocker and a fine pass re-

ceiver. The agressiveness and agility of junior tackle Jim Anderson has been a "pleasant surprise" to over last year.

Moss. The coach called senior left guard Randy Scott "fast, a good blocker, and an experienced lineman." Coach Moss feels that Steve Preston, a senior who was converted from tackle to center this year, has done a good job and has shown steady improvement

In Moss' opinion, senior right guard Jim Maxwell has done an excellent job replacing the injured Ron Mautz. Moss said that senior Bob Droege, atwo-year letterman, has shown "good spirit and hustle" at the right tackle spot. The coach spoke highly of right end, senior Dave Stewart. Stewart, who just came to Webster last winter, has distinguished himself as an excellent pass receiver.

Backfield

Junior halfback Walt Smallwood has dazzled the opposition with his running. Smallwood can run the 100-yard dash in 10.2 seconds, and this speed plus his agility make him an excellent breakaway runner. Moss called senior fullback Dave Cloud "an explosive runner and the best blocker on the team." The coach said that Neal Losse, although hampered by injuries, has done well at pass-receiving;Losse also runs well from the right halfback position.

Coach Moss rated Clarence Thornhill as "potentially great, a fine passer, a good runner, and an aggressive leader on the field." Thornhill, who has secured the position of first string quarterback, is only a sophomore.

Records indicate exciting contest

Although Webster and Kirkwood season records point to a close contest, almost anything can happen in the 62-year-old rivalry. Coaches and players do not expect an easy victory for either team.

The two teams' records are about even. Webster compiled an overall record of 4-4-1 while their league standing was 2-3-1. The Pioneers have a 5-4-0 overall record and a 3-3-0 league record. Both squads have identical records against league opponents with the exception of Ritenour which Webster tied and Kirkwood defeated.

The Statesmen opened their season with a 33-6 loss to fourth-ranked Belleville. In their first home game, the Webster eleven downed Hillcrest of Springfield 12-6. The season's only tie game was a 7-7 battle with the Ritenour Huskies.

In their next game, the Statesmen fell to the McCluer Comets 30-14. Webster's fifth game was a 24-6 romp over University City. In two league contests the squad lost to Riverview 14-0 and edged Normandy 7-6 Playing the league champions, Webster lost a 27-26 heart-breaker to the Ladue Rams here. In a warm-up for the T-Day contest, the Statesmen trounced Maplewood 33-14.

For their first nine games this season the Webster Mossmen have gained a net total of 1906 yards including 618 in the air, 1488 on the ground and minus 200 yards on
