
Guidance Council turn-ins increase

White clinches '64 youth convention

Denny White, student body president, was elected Student Governor of Missouri by a YMCA Youth and Government Model Convention on December 14. Denny will assume Governor Dalton's position at Jefferson City on April 3 and 4.

Student legislators will participate in the two-day legislature to be held in the actual Senate and House chambers in Jefferson City. Across the street from the Capital Building, mock cases will be appealed to the Model Supreme Court by other participants in the program. Addressing the opening session of the Model Congress, Denny will recommend his prepared legislative platform. During the assembly he will handle press coverage and be of general assistance to the delegates.

Bills will be debated on the floor according to actual legislative procedure. Denny will again address the student congressmen at the close of the session and tell which of the proposed bills he signed and which he vetoed.

On January 14, Denny met Governor Dalton when the governor stopped in St. Louis to address the St. Louis-St. Louis County delegation of state legislators.

In June, Denny and the student governors of other states will have the honor of meeting President Lyndon B. Johnson at the White House.

The steps leading up to final production begin with the selection of a play of good literary quality. Because acting is a learning process, Mrs. Ernestine Smizer, head of the dramatics department, selects a play that is worthwhile and interesting to high school students. Another factor to consider is that restrictive stage conditions of the Little Theatre are prohibitive to many plays.

Next, try-outs are held. Mrs. Smizer likes to give novice actors an opportunity to perform. After casting is completed, players meet for reading rehearsals where they analyze the play and characters.

Adhering to a demanding schedule of daily two-hour rehearsals, student actors are also responsible for scenery, lighting, and costumes. The assistant director sees that the play runs smoothly and that backstage complications are avoided. Although she does give

cues, the student director never prompts. "We've had more adlibbing on that stage," recalled Mrs. Smizer, "but the students know and understand their characters so well that they can fill in smoothly."

The last step is the finished production, complete with costumes, scenery, make-up, actors, and audience.
