"Five Mellow Winds," a number arranged in the style of Glenn Miller, will be one of the compositions featured at the Webster High Band Concert, February 28. Roger Cannady, on first clarinet, will play the lead in the "Winds" number. On tenor saxaphone will be Jim McDonald and Bill Whiston, and on alto saxaphone will be Earl Reeves and Mike Bowman.

"The Midnight Fire Alarm" will be a change of pace for both the audience and the band. This selection, a musical description of pandemonium, will feature the wail of sirens, the hiss of an old steam engine, rumbling wheels on cobble stones, galloping fire-horses, and the shouts and chaos of a midnight fire alarm.

On March 13, the Statesmen Band will perform in Mexico, Missouri and at the University of Missouri. This will be the first time a Webster Band has ever appeared at the university campus. The tour will be financed by proceeds from the Band Chocolate sales.

Proposed tax levy to boost salaries

"In these times, as never before, the future of our young people depends upon the quality of their education. We have a chance to effect this by our decision on February 27," stated Superintendent of Schools Dr. George W. Brown in reference to the operational tax levy.

At present, Webster citizens are paying a \$2.92 school tax and a \$.66 bonds and interests tax. If the proposed rate passes, the school tax would be increased to \$3.15 annually, and the bonds and interests tax would be reduced to \$.62 thus creating a \$.19 increase on each \$100 of assessment.

The levy has been proposed to expanded accommodate a student enrollment, to increase teachers' salaries on an "Experience-training" schedule, and to meet the rising costs of materials.

Qualifications

Candidates for school president or vice-president must have attended Webster since the tenth grade and have maintained at least a 2.5 grade average. The president presides over the Student Council. serves as an ex officio member of most committees, and represents the school at all times. The vice-president assists the president and serves as chairman of the Guidance Council.

Platforms explained

An open forum between the candidates and students will be held in the auditorium after school today. Interested students will have a chance to clarify the candidates' platforms by asking questions. Elections will be held Thursday before or after school, or during the lunch hours in the cafeteria.
